**MOULTON.**

MOULTON is a large and handsome village, nearly 3 miles W. of Holbeach, and 5 miles E. by N. of Spalding. It has a Station on the Bourn and Lynn branch of the Great Northern line. Its population increased from 1228 in 1801 to 2272 in 1871, and it contains 11,005 acres of land, including a long tract of fertile fen land, extending six miles southward, and an extensive range of rich marsh land, stretching six miles northward to Fosdyke Wash, and exclusive of 600 acres still covered by the tides at high water, but bearing a scanty herbage and samphire beds. The parish has many large scattered farm houses, and the hamlets of *Austindyke or Asendyke*, 2½ miles S.; *Eaugate*, 4½ miles S.; *Moulton Chapel*, 4 miles S.; and *Seasend*, 2 miles N. by E. of Moulton; the last named being on the marsh, and the others on the fens. Lord Boston is lord of the manor of Fitzwalter and a moiety of Dominorum; and E. Westwood, Esq., of the manor of Harrington and a moiety of Dominorum; the manor of Spalding extends into this parish. The chief landed proprietors are the lords of the manors, the Crown, Mrs. Johnson, Lord Say and Sele, St. John's College, Cambridge, W. C. Christie, Esq., J. P. Savage, Esq., James King, H. H. Tatam, Esq., and



the Dodson, Everard and Buckworth families. The village, anciently called Moulton, is said to have originated in A.D. 1100, under the auspices of Thomas de Moulton, the first Baron Moulton, whose family had a moated mansion here, in a place called Hall grounds, which they occupied occasionally till 1313, when Margaret, the daughter and heiress of the last Lord Moulton de Gillsland, married Baron Dacre, and left issue three daughters, one of whom married a Fitzwalter, another a Harrington, and the other died unmarried, and her portion of the Moulton estate was divided between the other two, so that the manors are now called "Fitzwalter, Harrington, and the moiety of Dominorum." In a green lane in this parish, called Old Spalding Gate, and formerly the main road across the country, stands a small ancient stone, called Elloe Stone, round which the wapentake court is said to have been held. Near Ravensbank, several Roman urns, of fine white and red earth, were dug up in 1721. On December 9th, 1765, a sudden and unexpected tide inundated the salt marsh, and drowned 2092 sheep, 7 beasts, and 13 horses; and on November 10th, 1810, another breach was made in the bank and considerable damage, and some loss of life occasioned. The Church (All Saints') is a fine building, consisting of nave, with aisles, chancel, south porch, and tower having a clock and 5 bells, and surmounted by a lofty crocketed spire. In 1868, the church was thoroughly restored, and fitted with open seats. The date of the nave appears to be about A.D. 1200, and the clerestory has externally a beautiful Transitional arcade. The chancel and tower are of Perpendicular work, of which period the tower is an early and good example. The benefice is a vicarage, valued in K.B. at £28. 13s. 4d., and now at £650, in the patronage of Mrs. Johnson, and incumbency of the Rev. John Russell Jackson, M.A., who has a spacious vicarage house, and 347 acres of glebe. The parish is tithe free. Moulton Chapel, at the hamlet of that name, 4 miles S. of the village, is a plain brick octagonal structure, rebuilt in 1722, and the living is a curacy, valued at £100, in the gift of the vicar, and incumbency of the Rev. Michael Sisson, of Spalding. A pretty Mission house, of red and white brick, in the Early Decorated style, was built at Seas end in 1868, at a cost of £750. It has an apsidal chancel, open seats, and stone pulpit, and is used on week days as a school, which is attended by about 60 children. There is a National School at Moulton Chapel, attended by 50 children. The Wesleyans have two chapels here; the Free Methodists have one at Moulton Chapel, lately enlarged; and at Seas end is a Primitive Methodist Chapel, built in 1835.

Moulton Free Grammar School was founded in 1561, by John Harroxe, or Horroxe, who endowed it with land in Moulton and Whaplode, increased at the enclosure to 275A. 35P., and now let for £650 per annum; but after payments of quit rents, repairs, &c., and the interest of £1100, borrowed on mortgage for drainage, enclosures, and erecting the new school building, this sum is reduced to about £600 yearly. In 1856, a scheme in Chancery was obtained, under which the management of the school was vested in twelve Trustees, the salary of the head master fixed at £150, and that of the second at £70, each to have a good residence, suitable for boarders, and a share of the capitation fees. At the same time the Rev. C. Moore, a late master, retired on an annuity of £100 from the funds of the Charity, by arrangement with the Commissioners. The school is now divided into Upper and Lower schools, which are conducted in separate buildings. That for the former, where classics, mathematics, and modern languages, &c., are taught, was built in 1856. It is open to all boys of the Wapentake of Elloe, and the Rev. B. Christopher-son, M.A., is the *head master*. The Lower school is held in the old building, erected in 1792, and is open to boys of Moulton; Mr. William Clarke is the *master*. The Poor's Land and Houses, comprising fifteen cottages and other buildings, and 81A. 1R. 36P., mostly copyhold, let for £215 per annum, have belonged to the poor parishioners from time immemorial, and the rents are distributed half-yearly. A new scheme for the management of the Poor's land and houses was obtained in 1870, which allows a portion of the income to be used for scholarships, hospitals, &c., and directs the residue to be applied by the trustees in relieving the necessitous poor, who are in receipt of parish relief. The poor have also the following yearly doles, viz.—£13 for two widows, from 4A. 3R. 28P., purchased with £50 left by Ann Denny, in 1692; 20s. from land left by Richard Seaman, in 1667; 40s. left by William Gulson, in 1633; 26s. left by Erasmus Amy, in 1655; 52s. left by John Rea, in 1676, out of 5A. of land which Hy. Holland, in 1815, bequeathed wholly to the poor; £4. 6s. 8d. left by Sir Anthony Irby, out of Lord Boston's estate; and £5 in coals, as the interest of £100, left by Jacob Davey, in 1833.

## PINCHBECK.

PINCHBECK is a neat village, on the Donington road, 2 miles N. of Spalding. The population of its parish increased from 1538 in 1801 to 3149 in 1871, and it extends over 13,070 acres of land, including the scattered hamlets enumerated below, and an extensive tract of fertile fen, stretching from about 7



miles W. and S.W. to the borders of Deeping Fen. It includes part of Cowbit Wash. Mrs. Johnson and C. F. Bonner, Esq., are lady and lord of the manors, but a great part of the soil belongs to Earl Brownlow, Lord Say and Sele, T. R. Buckworth, Esq., and the Plowright, Beatson, Beridge, Duncombe, Atty, Sharpe, Wayet, Fletcher and other families. Mr. M. I. Aitken has a flax scutching mill here, and employs about 100 hands. Pinchbeck, or Otway Hall, so called from the families who occupied it, was a moated mansion, but was taken down in 1802, and a spacious mansion, called The Hall, erected near its site, in 1812. In 1742, a brass coin of Commodus was found in the gardens, and in the following year, several pipes of baked earth were dug up. The Parish Church (St. Mary) is a spacious and handsome fabric, consisting of a nave of five bays, with aisles, chancel with north aisle, south porch, a fine western doorway, and massive square tower with a clock and five bells. The chancel contains a restored piscina and sedilia for two priests, and the rood stair case remains. In 1864, the interior was well restored, and fitted with open seats, at the cost of the vicar, who, in 1855, spent a considerable sum in improving the building. The vicarage, valued in K.B. at £40. 6s. 4½d., and now at £700, is in the patronage and incumbency of the Rev. West Wayet, M.A., who has a large and handsome vicarage house. The National School is a spacious brick building, with master's residence, erected in 1844, and now enlarged. It is attended by about 130 children, and has an endowment of £34 a year, arising from a house and about 12 acres of land, of which 7 were allotted at the enclosure, and the remainder given at an early period by Thomas Hotchkin and Michael Mitchell. The Independents have a spacious chapel at Money Bridge, erected in 1787, and enlarged in 1844; the Free Church Methodists one, built in 1847; and the Baptists one, built in 1844. West Pinchbeck Church District, which was formed in 1851, comprises the Fen, Pinchbeck Bars, and all the western portions of the parish, which extend from 4 to 6 miles W. and S.W. The Church (St. Bartholomew) is at Pinchbeck Bars, and is an exceedingly pretty structure, built in 1849, at a cost of £1500, chiefly given by the patron. It is in the Early Decorated style, from designs by Butterfield, and consists of a lofty nave with north aisle, chancel and south porch, and bell gable containing two bells. The interior is fitted with open seats, and has an organ, lately obtained, at a cost of £100. The east window is of three lights and is filled with stained glass. The living is a vicarage, valued at £200, in the patronage of the Rev. W. Wayet, and incumbency of the Rev. P. S. Wilson, M.A., who has a good vicarage house. The district National School is now attended by about 100 children, and is about to be considerably enlarged. In 1866, a cottage and garden were conveyed to the vicar and churchwardens, by Mr. T. Plowright, senior, for the use of the schoolmaster. The Free Methodists have a chapel here, erected in 1863. *Poddehole* is a hamlet, 2 miles S. of the village, and is chiefly remarkable as being the lowest point of this fen district, and hence the spot selected for the erection of pumping works for the drainage of the Deeping and Pinchbeck fens (described with Spalding). It contains an excellent National School, erected in 1866, and attended by 50 children, in which Divine service is held on Sundays; and a Baptist Chapel, erected about 1852. The poor have the following yearly doles, viz., £16 from 5A. 1R. of land, left by Robert Baggott, in 1708; £22 from land, &c., left by Bevil Wimberley, in 1725, and augmented at the enclosure; 20s. left by Roger Warriner, out of a house and land, at Money Bridge; 10s. left by Samuel Purday, out of 2½ acres in the South Field, belonging to Mr. William Colvin; £9, the interest of £180, left by Mrs. Mary Wayet, in 1831; £8. 4s., the interest of £183, left by William Long, in 1785; and £8. 8s., the rent of 4 acres of land at Surfleet.
