**DONINGTON** is a parish and ancient market town, at the junctions of the roads from Spalding and Grantham to Boston, with a station on the Spalding and Lincoln joint extension of the Great Northern and Great Eastern railways, 11 miles south-west from Boston, 10 north-by-west from Spalding, in the North Kesteven division of the county, wapentake of Kirton, petty sessional division of Kirton and Skirbeck, parts of Holland, Spalding union and county court district, rural deanery of North Holland No. 1, and archdeaconry and diocese of Lincoln. The town is lighted with gas by a limited company. The church of St. Mary and the Holy Rood is a fine building of stone, in the Early English, Decorated and Perpendicular styles, consisting of chancel, clerestoried nave of five bays, aisles, and on the south side an embattled tower with spire, 170 feet in height, relieved by three tiers of lights, and containing 6 bells: the tower and spire form the principal feature of the church: the entrance is through the base of the tower: the nave and south aisle are Decorated and the north aisle is of the same period, but later: the clerestory is embattled and lighted by seven windows on either side: the chancel retains a piscina and sedilia and on the north side is an arched recess, with a series of rude steps or shelves eastward of it; the original purpose of which is not obvious, but was probably intended as a buttress: the font is a fine example of Decorated work: the church was restored and re-seated in 1868 and a new vestry added, partly at the cost of the late Rev. John Wilson, then patron, who also left a legacy for the repair of the church: the east window and several others are memorials, and include one to the Rev. J. D. Grenside, a former vicar: there are 743 sittings. The churchyard was enlarged in 1865. The register dates from the year 1642. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £260, including 17 acres of glebe, with residence, in the gift of Simeon's trustees, and held since 1903 by the Rev. Edmund Freeman M.A. of Emmanuel College, Cambridge. Here is a Baptist chapel, founded in 1761, seating 75 persons; also Wesleyan and Primitive Methodist chapels. A cemetery was laid out by the Parish Council in 1900. The Rev. Anthony Barnes's charity has a yearly income of about £330; the remainder of this charity is administered by four trustees, viz.: the vicars of Donington and Pinchbeck and the rectors of Algarkirk and Wyberton, of which about £80 is devoted to educational purposes, for the benefit of clergymen's widows in the diocese. There are several small devises of land, managed by the churchwardens and overseers, the income being distributed yearly in money and kind. A sum of money, left by the late Enoch Millson esq. producing an income of £350 yearly, is in the hands of four trustees, of whom Richard Walter Peach is chairman, and is distributed in coals, clothing and pensions to the poor of Donington. The market day is on Thursday, and three annual fairs are held for horses and cattle, viz., May 26th, September 4th and October 17th. Dial Hall belongs to the Millson trustees, and is used for concerts and entertainments &c. A County Police Station was erected in 1859 and there is a court-house adjacent. Park House, the seat of Richard Glead esq. B.A., J.P. is a mansion of stone. Benjamin Smith esq. of Horbling, and Cowley's trustees are joint lords of the manor of Wykes, in this parish, and Cowley's trustees, Richard Glead esq. and William Dods esq. are the principal landowners. The soil is clay and silt; subsoil, clay. The chief crops are wheat, oats, beans, peas and potatoes. The area is 5,822 acres of land and 19 of water; rateable value, £13,051; population in 1901, 1,486.

**NORTHORPE** is a hamlet 1 mile north.

**SCHOOLS.**

Cowley's Free School & the schools in connection therewith were established in 1711, on the foundation of Mr. Thomas Cowley, & are governed under a scheme approved by the Charity Commissioners in 1896: a sum of £350 has been granted by the trustees to the managers of the Elementary school for elementary education: after providing for the upkeep of the estate the residue is devoted to the Grammar School. Donington Grammar School, enlarged & re-opened Sept. 30th, 1907, under a new scheme approved by the Board of Education, has accommodation for 90 boys & girls. The grounds comprise an area of about 5 acres: the buildings include residence for the masters & mistresses, house for the head master, recreation ground, cricket field, workshop, gymnasium & play grounds; James Nicholls Worman B.A. head master; Miss M. **DONINGTON-UPON-BAIN** (formerly Donnington-on-Baine) is a parish and pleasant village, with a station on the Lincoln and Louth branch of the Great Northern railway,  $7\frac{1}{2}$  miles south-west from Louth and 10 north from Horncastle; it is in the East Lindsey division of the county, parts of Lindsey, North division of the wapentake of Gartree. Louth petty sessional division, union and county court district, rural deanery of Louth Esk and Ludborough No. 3, archdeaconry of Stow and diocese of Lincoln. The church of St. Andrew is a building of stone in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave and a small embattled western tower containing 3 bells: the font is believed to be of Saxon date: the chancel was rebuilt by the late rector in 1855: there are 104 sittings. The register dates from the year 1655: the earlier portions are in a very dilapidated condition. The living is a rectory, net yearly value £230, arising from 213 acres of glebe, allotted in lieu of tithes in 1798, with residence, in the gift of Dr. Higgins J.P. of Louth, and held since 1904 by the Rev. Thomas Hutchinson Higgins M.A. of Gonville and Caius College, Cambridge. The church land amounts to about 8 acres. Here are Baptist, Wesleyan and Primitive Methodist chapels. The Foresters' Hall, built in 1879, is a plain structure of red brick and is let for public meetings and concerts, and will hold 200 persons. At the Inclosure upwards of 34 acres were allotted to the poor, in lieu of land which had

been purchased with £44 left by Elizabeth Lornen in 1660: the yearly income is now about £42 net, and is distributed on the first Thursday in December, one-third being appropriated for educational purposes and the remainder distributed in coals and money to the poor. T. W. Thimbleby esq. of Spilsby, who is lord of the manor, Joseph W. Ward and Walker Brothers are the chief land-owners. The soil is wold clay and sand. The crops are wheat, barley and turnips. The area is 1,800 acres; rateable value, £1,884; population in 1901, 343.
