HOLBEACH,

MOULTON, WHAPLODE AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

HOLBEACH, or, as it was formerly called, *Old-beche*, took its name from an old beach, near which the town was built, is a market-town, in the wapentake of Elloe, in the fen country, 109 miles from London, 12 from Boston and about eight from Spalding; it is celebrated in history for having been the birth-place of several very eminent and learned men; amongst the number of which was, Mr. Wm. Stukely, a learned antiquary, who was called, on account of his knowledge of British antiquity, the arch-druid; also Henry Rands, *alias* Holbeach, who was brought up in the abbey of Ramsey, was one of the compilers of the Liturgy, and was made bishop of Lincoln in 1547. In this town and neighbourhood have been found, at different periods, many valuable specimens of antiquities, particularly a curious urn, various coins, &c. The church, dedicated to All Saints, is a fine building, and very spacious, consisting of a nave, chancel, porch, aisles and spire steeple, and the north porch has two circular towers, with embattled parapets at its extreme angles, which gives it the appearance of a castle, more than a place for divine worship. The free grammar school here, was founded by George

Farmer, Esq. about the year 1670, who left lands and tenements in Holbeach and Weston, which now let for about £140. per annum; the school was formerly in a part of the church, but in 1807 a new building was erected, capable of holding two hundred children, and it has now one hundred and forty, which are educated upon Bell's system: the present master is the Rev. Robert Carruthers, minister of the church, who has an assistant. The market-day is Thursday: fairs, May 17th and September 17th, for horses and cattle. The population of the parish, in 1821, consisted of 3,621 persons.

MOULTON is a parish, containing a small village, in the same hundred as Holbeach, three miles from that town, with a small church and a free grammar school; and the whole parish contains about 1,600 inhabitants.

WHAPLODE is a parish, containing the small village and chapelry of WHAPLODE-DROVE, in the same hundred as Holbeach, two and a half miles from that town. This is entirely a grazing country, in which are no manufactures, and the trade it enjoys is quite dependent upon the agriculturist and grazier. The whole parish contained, in 1821, about 1,700 persons.

POST OFFICE, HOLBEACH, Robert Boothby Hoff, *Post Master*.—Letters arrive from SPALDING at half-past eleven in the morning, and are despatched at a quarter past three in the afternoon.

HORNCASTLE

Is a neat market-town and parish, pleasantly situated at the foot of that bold and even range of hills, which, from their openness, have been termed the wolds. It lies nearly in the centre of the Lindsey division of the county of Lincoln, and is the chief of a soke of fifteen parishes, to which it gives name, and is 136 miles from London, 21 from Lincoln, 10 from Spalding, and 9 from Stamford. The principal part of the town is built in an angle, formed by the confluence of two rivers, the Bane and the Waring, where an ancient fortification formerly stood, the site of which is still visible, denoting it to have been a station of importance in early times. Within the last century, the appearance of the town is completely changed. The rebuilding of many houses in the principal streets, in a handsome manner, within the last twenty years, has given to the town an air of respectability; but the effect which would be produced by these buildings, in its general appearance, is materially diminished by the narrowness and irregularity of the streets. The entrances to the town, as well as its general aspect, have been also improved by the enclosure of the fields by which it is surrounded. Since the completion of the canal, in 1801, a considerable trade in corn and wool has been carried on here; about thirty thousand quarters of the former and three thousand sheets of the latter being annually sent to this place, and the town also, from its situation, enjoys a large retail trade. The church, dedicated to St. Mary, though an ancient structure, from the numerous repairs which have been put upon it, has a modern look. The few por-

tions of the original architecture which have escaped the silent ravages of time, and the hands of the innovator, bespeak the building to have been erected about the period of Henry VII. In the wall of the north aisle is a stone, containing the figure of Sir Lyonel Dymoke, in armour, kneeling. Sir Lyonel Dymoke was one of the ancestors of the present family of that name, who perform the office of champion at the coronation of the kings of England. Scrivelsby court, the ancient baronial seat, is about two miles from Horncastle, and at it resides the gentleman who performed the office of champion at the coronation of his present Majesty King George IV. The benefice of this church is a vicarage, in the presentation of the Bishop of Carlisle, and in the incumbency of the Rev. Clement Madeley. The other places of worship are, a chapel each for the Wesleyan and primitive methodists, independents and calvinistic baptists. A building, situated on the south side of the church yard, is appropriated for the purposes of a dispensary, which is supported by subscription. A literary society, which was established here in 1790, formed a permanent library, which is kept at the dispensary, and contains about one thousand volumes, open to the members two days in the week. In the year 1807, an act for the recovery of debts under five pounds was obtained, and the commissioners hold their courts at this place, as well as at the other towns specified in the act, every 4th Thursday. The education of the poor, which has lately excited so much attention in various parts of the kingdom, has not been neglected here. A school on the Lancasterian, or British
