SPALDING,**AND THE VILLAGES OF PINCHBECK, SURFLEET AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.**

SPALDING, a market-town and parish, in the hundred of Elloe and parts of Holland, is 103 miles from London, 38 south-east of Lincoln, and 8 west of Holbeach, being in the midst of a fenny district, and almost encompassed by the river Welland, and an ancient drain, called the Westlode, and having numerous other drains in the vicinity, Spalding has been, with some degree of propriety, compared to a Dutch town. Its claim to antiquity is testified by many remains discovered in and about the town; and that it existed before the foundation of Croyland abbey, is evinced by Ethelbald's charter to that monastery. The church is an ancient light structure, built in the year 1284; its beautiful porch, however, appears to have been added about the end of the fifteenth century. It is dedicated to St. Mary and St. Nicholas, and the living is a curacy, in the patronage of certain trustees, and incumbency of the Rev. Wm. Moore. The other places of worship are for the general and particular baptists, methodists, independents, and a friends' meeting house. A free grammar school was erected in the reign of Elizabeth, by the will of John Blanch. Another, called the petty school, was founded in 1682, by Thomas Wellesley: here is also a blue-coat charity school. An almshouse, for twenty-two persons, was founded in 1590; and another, for eight widows, in 1709. The town-hall, or court-house, erected at the expense of Mr. John Holstan, is situated at the north-west end of the Market-place, the upper rooms are used for the quarter sessions, the courts leet and baron, and the courts of request and sewers; the lower part of the building is let for shops, and the rents appropriated to the use of the poor, conformable to the will of the donor. A new house of correction for the parts of Holland was erected here in 1824; and there is a small theatre in the town, which is occasionally open for the amusement of the inhabitants. In 1710 a literary, scientific and antiquarian society, called 'the gentlemen's society,' was established, and held in very

high repute, but it has for many years lost particular claim to notice; there are, however, still preserved to the existing members many valuable books, manuscripts, antiquities and natural curiosities; the divinity portion of the library is deposited in the vestry room of the church, and the classical volumes in the grammar school room. At PODE HILL, two miles from the town, two steam engines have been erected, for the more effectual drainage of the fens; the application of this description of power to such a purpose has been found to justify expectation, and proved highly beneficial to the agriculturist. Spalding, since the river Welland has been made navigable to the town, has a good carrying and coasting trade, barges of about forty tons burthen coming up to the centre of the town, where are quays and spacious storehouses; but vessels requiring a large draught come only to Boston, nine miles distant. Attempts have been made to introduce manufactures into this place, but without success: the town derives its chief support from agriculture and the extensive grazing carried on in its neighbourhood. Wool consequently forms a very prominent article in its trade; and some of the manufacturing towns of Yorkshire and Norfolk are supplied from hence. The market is held on Tuesday; and five fairs annually, viz. April 27th, June 29th, August 26th, September 25th, and Wednesday before December 6th, chiefly for horses and stock of all kinds; there are also two statutes for hiring servants. The population of the parish, in 1821, consisted of 2,454 males, and 2,753 females; total, 5,207.

PINCHBECK, a parish and village, in the same hundred as Spalding, two miles and a half from that town, contains a population of 2,099 inhabitants, the whole of which may be said to have their dependence upon the grazing and agricultural interest.

SURFLEET, a parish and village, in the hundred of Kirton, about four miles north of Spalding, contains one of the largest heronries in England, and about 800 inhabitants.

BOLINGBROKE, NEW BOLINGBROKE AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

SPILSBY, a small market-town and parish, in the soke of Bolingbroke and division of Lindsay, is 133 miles from London, 31 from Lincoln, and 14 from Stamford, situated on an eminence, overlooking to the south a large track of marsh and fen-land, which is bounded by the Boston deeps and German ocean. This town consists of four streets, that unite in the Market-place, and which form a spacious square; at the east end is the market-cross, a plain octagonal shaft, with a quadrangular base, terminated with a modern fan, the whole being situated on five steps. Here is a town hall, in which are held the general quarter sessions of the peace for the south division of the parts of Lindsay; an endowed grammar school, and two Sunday-schools. The church, dedicated to St. James, is an ancient stone edifice, the living of which is in the patronage of Lord Gwydir (the lord of the manor) and in the incumbency of the Rev. J. Holloway. Two chapels, one each for the methodists and calvinists, are the other places of worship here. At the White Hart Inn is a subscription library and news' room. The market is held on Monday; and the fairs on the Monday before, and first and second Monday after Whit-Monday (when Whitsuntide does not fall in May there is no fair on the latter day); and on the third Monday in July, for cattle and clothing. The population of the parish, in 1821, consisted of 1,234 inhabitants.

BOLINGBROKE, a parish, once a market-town, in **POST OFFICE**, near the White Hart, SPILSBY, Sarah Panton, *Post Mistress*.—Letters from LONDON are despatched at a quarter past one, and arrive at one at noon.—To LOUTH letters are despatched at half-past one, and arrive at a quarter past one at noon.—**BOLINGBROKE**, post office, near the Duke's Head, John Clemant, *Post Master*.—A horse Mail from HORNCASTLE is despatched every afternoon at half-past three, and arrives every morning (Sunday excepted) at half-past eleven.

the western division of the soke to which it gives name, and in the parts of Lindsay, is 4 miles w.s.w. of Spilsby and 132 north of London; it is seated on a clear and rapid brook, from which its name is derived, was once a place of considerable importance, and is remarkable for being the birth-place of Henry IV. The church, dedicated to St. Peter and St. Paul, is a neat small ancient structure of stone, of the Gothic form, with a square tower; the living is a rectory, united with Hareby, in the gift of the Right Hon. — Quin, and the Rev. Dr. Strong is the incumbent. Here is a free school, founded by Mr. Chamberlain, in 1588, and a methodist chapel. The King, as Duke of Lancaster, is lord of the manor. Bolingbroke gives title of viscount to the family of St. John, of Lydiard Tregone, in Wiltshire. The town lies flat, in an agricultural district; the land is fertile, and the country around hilly, interspersed with pleasing views. About 800 inhabitants form the population of this parish.

NEW BOLINGBROKE, 7 miles s.s.w. of Bolingbroke, and 8 from Horncastle, is a recently erected town, to which place the market of the old town was removed in 1821, where it is now held, on Tuesday; the fair on the 10th of July being kept at both places. A methodist chapel has recently been erected here, and it is said that the commissioners for building churches have consented to erect one at this new settlement. The population of this place has not been taken.
