SUTTON (LONG)

GEDNEY, FLEET AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

SUTTON, or Sutton St. Mary, is a small but improving market-town and parish, in the hundred of Elloe and division of Holland, 107 miles north from London and 5 from Holbeach. The church, dedicated to St. Mary, is a neat structure, with a spire of frame work, covered with lead, formerly used as a land mark. The living is a rectory, and the Rev. T. L. Bennett is the patron and incumbent. Here is a free grammar school, supported by 'Phillips' charity,' for the education of forty children. An act of parliament has recently been obtained, for the purpose of erecting a bridge over the Cross Keys' wash, about three miles S. E. of this place, and which stupendous undertaking will unite Lincolnshire with Norfolk: this wash is a large estuary, under water when the tide is in, and passable for travellers from the wash-house in Lincolnshire, but the passage is extremely dangerous without a guide, and many lives have been lost in attempting to ford it; of course the bridge, when completed, will become a great accommodation, and will, no doubt, have the effect of infusing into the

market of Long Sutton more importance than it now possesses. The market-day is on Friday, and since its revival in 1824 has been tolerably well-attended and supplied. About 2,400 persons form the population of this parish.

GEDNEY, about two miles south-east of Holbeach, is a village and parish, remarkable for its beautiful church, built, as Dr. Stukeley supposes, by the abbot of Crowland, who had a house on the north side of the church, and large possessions in the parish; the upper part of the tower is of the same date with the church, but built upon other work. The number of inhabitants in the parish, including the chapelry of GEDNEY HILL, is about 1,800.

FLEET, a village and parish, near Holbeach, is remarkable for the steeple standing at a distance from the church. Here was found, not many years ago, three pecks of Roman copper coins, piled down edgeways, most of them of the Emperor Gallienus. The number of inhabitants in this parish, according to the last census, was about 800.

**TATTERSHALL AND CONINGSBY.**

TATTERSHALL, a small market town & parish, in  
the hundred of Gartree, 128 miles N.E. of London and  
9 s. w. of Horncastle, is situated on the river Bane,  
near its junction with the Witham. This place was  
granted by William the Conqueror to Eudo, one of  
his Norman followers, a descendant of whom erected  
a stately castle here; they were barons of parliament,  
and from this place assumed the name of Tattershall.  
The castle, demolished in the civil wars, stood on a

moorish level, surrounded by two great fosses, sup-  
plied with water from the Bane. The principal gate-  
way was remaining till within a few years back; the  
part at present standing was built by Sir Ralph Crom-  
well, who was treasurer of the exchequer in the reign  
of Henry VI. The church, which stands on the east-  
side of the outer moat, is a beautiful and spacious edi-  
fice, built in the form of a cross, consisting of a nave,  
a transept, and magnificent choir; the latter of which
