GEDNEY, FLEET AND NEIGHBOURHOODS.

SUTTON, or Sutton St. Mary, is a small but improving market-town and parish, in the hundred of Elloe and division of Holland, 107 miles north from London and 5 from Holbeach. The church, dedicated to St. Mary, is a neat structure, with a spire of frame work, covered with lead, formerly used as a land mark. The living is a rectory, and the Rev. T. L. Bennett is the patron and incumbent. Here is a free grammar school, supported by 'Phillips' charity,' for the education of forty children. An act of parliament has recently been obtained, for the purpose of erecting a bridge over the Cross Keys' wash, about three miles s.
