
Blacksmithing – Having Fun









Blacksmithing

Young people have been working at the forge since at least the early 1800s. In groups young visitors will have the chance to wear a blacksmith's apron, using the tools and the fire to make a metal object they can take home with them.

All forge activities are conducted by an experienced, volunteer.

While children are working at the forge, their classmates are able to:

- Ask questions about the process
- Take pictures with digital cameras for school displays
- Make sketches of the forge
- Create word clouds and images for use in poems and stories
- Get involved with a range of other activities

As well as providing a stimulus for Literacy activities such as creative writing, the Forge Fun session supports areas of the National Curriculum including:

Science:

- Observe and ask questions
- Understand everyday materials and how they change

Art:

- Sketching the forge
- Using different materials to capture the sights and sounds of the forge

Design:

- Performing practical tasks
- Consider design criteria

The practical forge activity gives children the chance to take part in an exciting creative process that they will have never experienced before, building their confidence.
