

Fen churches – in full bloom

The magnificent churches of South Lincolnshire stand tall among the flat fenlands like perpendicular "Jewels in the Crown".

This heritage of vast and beautiful stone buildings often surprises visitors who wonder how such splendid edifices, built to the glory of God by the skill of man, came to be so abundant in what was a sparsely populated isolated corner of England.

The answer is — sheep. The rich wool merchants who grazed their flocks round the land edges of the fens in the early Middle Ages, and again flourished after the draining of the Fens in the late 17th century, helped build and endow many churches.

What better way to be remembered for their benefactions on earth, and hopefully work their passage for a seat in Heaven?

Here in South Holland we have a cathedral size church in the middle of a field (Gedney), a magnificent Abbey ruin at historic Crowland, a leaning spire to rival Pisa (Surfleet), England's oldest timber spire (Long Sutton) ... to name but a few.

So our churches are worth visiting, especially at Tulip Time when almost every one is decorated and many put on major flower festivals which attract thousands of visitors.

Then there's the food, in church halls throughout the area you will find delicious home baking at budget prices, anything from a small meal to a simple snack.


Tulip Time is full of sights and sounds which add up to a total experience for the thousands of people who flock to Spalding and district through the six weeks season.







Special day for Specials

For the first time in 16 years South Holland smallholder Geoff Payne will be watching Spalding Flower Parade in style because he is a "Special".

Divisional Officer Payne, in charge of special constables in the Boston and Spalding area, is usually out among the thousands who congregate around Springfields Gardens to watch the show.

Along with all his "Specials" he spends long hours on the job of providing friendly local knowledge and advice to many of the thousands of visitors who flock to Spalding over Flower Parade weekend.

But this year on Flower Parade Day Geoff will be guest of honour at the district council's official luncheon at the town's civic centre.

He will be there on behalf of the Specials to receive the trophy awarded each year by the Worshipful Company of Gardeners "for special services to tulip time".

The magnificent silver trophy has been awarded to the regular police. parade officials, church festival organisers, the flower parade committee, St John Ambulance, and other groups and individuals whom the district council Tulip Time Committee recognise as having made a vital contribution to the town's great annual event.

So Geoff Payne and his wife Beryl will join the district council chairman, Coun Tom Barker, the Master of the Worshipful Company, neighbouring civic and county leaders and other guests on the council's viewing stand in Churchgate to watch the 27th flower parade pass by.

Geoff Payne is 55, he lives in Gedney Drove End, one of the remote marsh villages reclaimed from the sea, and so blessed with some of the richest growing land in the country.

He was born and bred "in the Drove End" and has run a smallholding near the village centre since he was 21.

The little wooden bungalow in which Geoff and Beryl set up home has long been replaced by a modern

brick home with every comfort.

But stout "wellies" outside the back porch testify to the fact that smallholders spend much of their time in muddy, back-breaking work as they tend the young stock.

As with so many couples in this district, smallholding is a way of life

and a partnership between the pair. As Geoff said: "It's a joint effort. I couldn't do it without Beryl or our daughter Julie, who lives in the village and helps out when needed.

Geoff Payne has been a "Special" since 1968 - he joined as a new interest after several years playing football for the village team.

At this time the famous "chicken patrols" were part of the Specials' duties!

These were time-honoured tramps before Christmas when Special Constables made their presence felt in the remote droves and drains where chickens and turkeys were being bred

The idea was to discourage anyone who might chance his arm for a free Christmas dinner.

Geoff Payne had three years as a Special Constable before promotion to sergeant for the Drove End and Sutton Bridge. Promotion to Inspector followed in 1974 and he took over as Divisional Officer in charge in 1983.

Of his 104 Specials today, only 24 are female and he would like the force to be more balanced, believing that many more girls would enjoy the service now that special police duties are

much more professional.

He said: "We have training nights once a month, based on regular officer courses in police procedure. Nowadays there are a lot more regulations. The Special of today have intelligence tests based on the same principles which face regular recruits and have to go before an interview board."

Geoff, the police superintendent, and the local inspector with responsibility for Specials, make up the board and there is a full weekend of training at the county police headquarters at Lincoln before the new Special goes on duty.

Up to the rank of section officer, recruits can serve from 18 to 55 years, over that rank they can go on until 60.

Today, in South Holland, the Specials are in a new era. There are not as many of them now, but younger people are joining a community service where every member is expected to regard him or herself as a profes-

In an emergency, the specials have a call-out system, with a symbol after each name denoting degrees of availability for duty.

"But, as with everything else, those busiest in their own occupations are always the ones willing to do more, he said.

The Paynes are an example of this "always ask the busiest people" philosophy.

Geoff is also a parish councillor, through interest in the welfare of his own village community and Beryl is a leading Women's Institute member.

It is not surprising that Geoff is bound up in the land which bred him, for he has the distinction of being the descendant of a man whose name is now a familiar geographical location.

When any local resident visits the marshes, he's likely to be "going up Shep White's".

This is the name given to the spot on the furthest reaches, the nearest a car can get to the sea embankment.

There was a Shep White, and he

was Geoff Payne's great-grandfather. His own mother was born in a little cottage, now vanished, which marked one of the remotest - and some would think the most mysterious and beautiful - places in South Lincoln-

Friendly parade day

Out and about in Spalding on Flower Parade Day you'll find many familiar blue-clad uniformed figures enjoying the fun along with everyone else.

The boys — and girls — in blue are the Lincolnshire Constabulary, both regulars and the volunteer specials.

It's a big day for the police. About 150 regulars and specials are on duty, the locals augmented by personnel from Lincoln, Grantham, Skegness and Boston.

They are all here to ensure that the invasion of Spalding on Parade Day remains the friendly hassle-free event it always has been.

The planning is meticulous. The town is split into 14 sections, each section has its own space in the control centre in Winfrey Avenue, where both regulars and specials muster to receive instructions from their own sergeant.

Each sergeant has his own box with radios, armlets, instructions and meal tickets — 389 dinners and 414 teas keep the inner man going over the Saturday and Sunday.

The specials have a vital role to play in the light-handed good-tempered crowd control which is a feature of the festival atmosphere.

Their secret weapon is LOCAL KNOWLEDGE. The specials live here

so they are the folk who know the shortest routes out of town, where food, services and car parks can be found, and, very important, where all the loos are.

The men and women with the "S" on their shoulder flash come from all sorts of occupations.

They perform their duties for love the only money involved is petrol expenses and the annual £20 boot allowance — which can only be claimed if

the special constable has put in over 100 hours duty that year.

Listen to Inspector Keith Woods, the Spalding police officer in charge of local specials.

"We're getting on fine. There are much closer contacts with the regular force and a much wider role for specials to play in the community.

"The specials have been turning out regularly on a voluntary basis to cover for officers involved in the miners' dispute and we are very grateful to them.

"The material we are getting these days is very good. Volunteers are joining now because of a genuine interest in making a contribution to the work of the police.

"At Tulip Time they are invaluable, in addition to the extra strength, they are people with a good local knowledge, invaluable in dealing with so many visitors."

Inspector Woods is "absolutely delighted" that the specials have been honoured as this year's recipients of the award for services to Tulip Time.

"This year is my 13th in charge of the parade police control room and I can say without any reservation that their service is invaluable and very much appreciated."







CAR PARKING: Finding somewhere for the huge number of coaches and cars arriving in Spalding is a mammoth problem. But over the years we've become experts, and there is adequate hard standing for the heavier buses and space for many thousands of cars. School grounds and industrial sites are used and farmers also help out by offering space in fields on the outskirts of town. Camping and caravan facilities are available at three district council sites, and others in the town, so many visitors now stay several days in Spalding and district.

For drivers new to the area, parking can be a bit of a problem and they (and their passengers) are asked to take careful note of exactly where the vehicles are left — so that there is no panic after the parade. Each major car and coachpark is clearly signposted. The central bus park is in Winfrey Avenue close by the float exhibition field where the parade starts and ends. Other major bus parks are at Springfields (top right of map) and on the big Geest Industries complex in West

March Road, by West Elloe bridge.

TRAFFIC SYSTEMS: On Parade Day, May 4, roads are re-opened to traffic as soon as possible after the parade passes by. On Sunday, May 5, a one-way system operates in a clockwise direction round the town's main thoroughfares, taking in the float exhibition, Springfields and the town centre.

TOURIST BUS SERVICES: A town bus service which carries passengers between the float exhibition in the town centre and Springfields Gardens will operate all day Saturday, May 4 and Sunday, May 5.

No excuse for being hung

Food, glorious food is as much a part of Tulip Time as the flowers.

Feeding the visitors is a mammoth operation, carried on in almost every church, chapel and village hall throughout South Holland, and by sports associations and other local groups.

Whether it is home-baked teas, hot or cold lunches, soup and sandwiches, or just the odd cup of coffee, legions of local women put their time and their talents into a double job - helping their own organisation's funds and providing a vital service for the thousands who flock to the district during the six weeks the bulbs are in bloom.

Parishioners of St. Gilbert and St. Hugh, Gosberton Clough and Risegate venture quite a way from their Fen village for their yearly role - as main caterers on the arena at Springfields Gardens during the annual Flower Parade weekend country fair.

This church group have been feeding Springfields visitors for nine years — long before the Springfields fair became an attraction in its own right.

The group decided to back up the National Farmer's Union effort at Springfields early on, and in the beginning just six helpers provided soup and cups of tea from a caravan.

Now the majority of church ladies - and quite a few of their men - rally round each year in a massive effort which takes a lot of forward planning.

All the home-baking is donated by the cooks (Lincolnshire dough cake is one speciality) and classy country fare is the popular style which attracted visitors to the tune of £1300 raised for church funds last year.

On Parade Day six of the team stand and make sandwiches all day long. There are country vegetables and salads to go with such delicacies as salmon, chicken and turkey, not processed, but carved on the spot in good Lincolnshire tradition.

Bank Holiday Bonanza

Springfields Gardens have again organised a Bank Holiday Bonanza over Parade weekend with a repeat of their Country Fair. Not only will visitors see the magnificent tulip displays, indoor gardens and woodland walks but 75 stands and stalls will be selling a wide variety of goods. There will be arts and crafts, a country life museum, kiddies corner, vintage tractors, in fact something for everybody.

Live entertainment is, of course, the major attraction with the Flower Parade actually travelling through the gardens on Parade Saturday at approximately 3.00 p.m. Prior to the Parade the crowds will be entertained by the Wellingborough Redwell Band and the Spalding Drum and Trumpet

On Sunday at noon the famous Romsey Old Cadets, stars of the Flower Parade, will perform their comedy routine on the central lawn at Springfields to the delight of their supporters. Once seen, never forgotten!

The Silver Spoon Square Dance Club with their American caller will take over the arena from 12.45 p.m. to 1.30 p.m. for a colourful hoe-down with country music.

At 2.30 p.m. on Sunday the annual Marching Band competition takes place with six of the East Midlands top bands challenging for the Springfields

On Bank Holiday Monday the City of Nottingham Drum and Trumpet Corp will present (at 1.00 p.m. and 3.00 p.m.) their very polished marching and counter march display with flagwaving majorettes. This band, having taken part in the Parade for many years, is now concentrating on the arena displays for which it is famous.

Work on Springfields was begun in 1964 and the gardens opened to the public in 1966. Since that time well over 2,000,000 people have seen the displays.

Designed by Carl van Emplen, an international landscape architect, the gardens were primarily laid out for the display of tulips and daffodils. In 1975 the Springfields Council (which administers the gardens) in conjunction with the Association of Rose Breeders planted 7,500 rose bushes to provide a display for a summer season.

There are now 12,000 rose bushes (mainly new varieties) in the gardens and these are continually updated. To complement the roses the major seed houses help to provide up to 200,000 bedding plants which are planted in June after the bulbous flowers have been lifted.

These displays with the backdrop of flowering trees, shrubs, woodland walks, lake etc., make Springfields one of Britain's most popular show gardens.

The two large glasshouses have fine tulip displays this spring and will be filled with hanging baskets and beds of geraniums, begonias, petunias and impatiens in the summer.



Springfield has been transformed by the new summer season, and again, special events have been arranged for 1985. On Sunday, 14th July and Sunday, 18th August, "A Gardeners' Day Out" has been organised. These popular events provide visitors with the opportunity to accompany gardening experts round the gardens to hear at first hand advice on gardening problems and plant identification.

Sunday, 28th July, will see Springfields Vintage Vehicle Rally which includes a major display of tractors, some dating back to the turn of the century. Lincolnshire is famous for agricultural equipment and Springfields is an attractive venue for both young and old to view these magnificent machines together with many cars, motor-

Springfields is a registered charity and relies on admissions at the gate for its main income. The horticultural industry donate many of the bulbs, trees, shrubs and plants but the gardens are labour intensive and much work is carried out during the close season, October to March each year.

In your garden...

Anyone can grow tulips or daffodils. All you have to do is use your common sense and follow a few simple rules.

First and foremost you have to sort out the bulbs. It's important to choose the best. "Bargains" are not always what they seem so it pays to buy from a reputable source.

One general rule to remember is that for effective flowering the bigger the bulb the better. Tulips should be at least 10 cm in circumference and egg sized and double nosed daffodil bulbs are best.

Where to plant. Any well drained soil, the lighter the better, will grow good bulbs. Plant daffodils in September and tulips in October/November.

One thing that bulbs can't stand is water logging. So, if you are growing on heavy land, a little sand under the bulbs will help drainage.

Some form of organic matter will probably help whatever your soil is like. Compost leaf mould or peat is best.

Fresh manure should never be used but garden fertiliser can be applied if necessary. Plant with a trowel, seeing there are no air pockets beneath the bulb.

Now, the ideal depth for planting varies with the type of soil. In very light soil which dries out easily the bulb can go deeper than in heavy, stiff soil.

A good general rule is to plant at about two to three

times the diameter — measuring from the top of the bulb to the surface.

Spacing will vary according to the effect you want, but remember that tulips and daffodils look their best when grown in mass. But they need breathing space.







Springfields Horticultural Society Ltd

The Springfields Horticultural Society Ltd, the body responsible for organising the annual display in the gardens of Springfields, was formed in 1966 under the sponsorship of the South Holland (Lincolnshire) Horticultural Association, a specialist branch of the Holland (Lincs) County Branch of the National Farmer's Union.

The Society is a registered charity, its principal object being to promote the study and practice of horticulture in all its branches and in particular the cultivation and development of all varieties of flowers grown from bulbs and corms.

Under its constitution, the income of the Society must be expended in carrying out its objects. By organising the annual display in the gardens, the Society enables members of the public to see the wide varieties of bulbs and corms available, and how best they can be used to beautify the small garden. There is in the gardens an information centre where visitors are able to obtain answers to their queries regarding the growing of bulbs and corms.

The Society organises lectures on horticultural topics, and participates in various horticultural exhibitions and

The Society has been working closely with the Ministry of Agriculture, Fisheries and Food on experimental programmes concerning bulb diseases and their treatment, and it co-operates with other societies in running trials in the gardens.

Any member of the public is eligible to apply for

associate membership of the Society. An annual subscription of £7.50 is payable by Associate Members, who enjoy certain privileges relative to admission to the gardens.
