At a special Court Baron of the Right Honourable Tampon, Lord Viscount Lord of the said  
Manor held in and for the same on Saturday the first Day of April in the Year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred  
and ten Before Robert Goldsmith George Wedderburn two customary Tenants of the said Manor and Jurors of the said  
Court by Samuel Edward the younger Gunthorpe Deputy Sheriff of the County of the said Manor <sup>his</sup> his manor.

21<sup>st</sup> April 1810

The Writs Court came Samuel Maddock of the Town and County of the Town of Spalding Surgeon and Elizabeth Gunthorpe his Wife which said Elizabeth Ann Maddock is a customary Tenant of the said Manor and who before her Marriage with the said Samuel Maddock was called Elizabeth Ann Thompson spinster she the said Elizabeth Ann being first solely and secretly in the Absence of her said Husband examined by the said Deputy Sheriff and Joseph Rose Esq; concerning that she was not therewith compelled to surrender by the Rent into the Hands of the Lord of the said Manor by her Hands and Acceptance of the said Surrender of Deputy Sheriff and according to the Custom thereof All that Cottage now divided in two Tenements Blacksmiths Shop and one Room more or less of Samuel Maddock customary Land used as a Garden lying behind the same holder of the said Manor of Spalding with its Members situated and being in Spalding aforesaid on the East side of the River Welland and near to the Draw Bridge there bounded by Lands of the heirs of Theophilus Buckworth Esquire towards the South and South East by the High Street and thence River Welland on the West and by several Hereditaments of the said Samuel Maddock sole and undivided to be forthcoming <sup>to</sup> W: Thomas Thorpe and W: William Maples respectively towards the North subject nevertheless to the making and for ever maintaining a sufficient Rent on the North side thereof next to the said Premises sold to the said Thomas Thorpe and William Maples which said Cottage Blacksmiths Shop Hereditaments and Premises were in the Time or Occupation of the said Joseph Rose and Thomas Johnson or their respective Under tenants and are part and parcel of certain Estates and Hereditaments which in or about the Year one thousand seven hundred and eighty four were purchased by the said William Thompson deceased of and from the Reverend George Johnson together with all Carts Watercourses Hedges Ditches Drains Seven and profits Commodities Adventures Hereditaments Rights Members Privileges and Appurtenances whatsoever to the same Premises and part thereof belonging or in any wise appertaining and the Reversion and Reversions Remainder and Remainers yearly and other Rents Quirs and profits thereof And also all the Estate Right Title Interest Use Trust Property Pleasance Claim and Demand whatsoever both at Law and in Equity of them the said Samuel Maddock and Elizabeth Ann his Wife or either of them their and theirs to the use and Benefit of Joseph Rose of Spalding aforesaid Blacksmith his Heirs and Assigns forever according to the custom of the said Manor which said Joseph Rose the Lord of the said Manor by his said Deputy Sheriff did grant and deliver Seize thereof by the Rent to Hold the said Cottage and Blacksmiths Shop Land Hereditaments and Premises with the Appurtenances unto his said Joseph Rose his Heirs and Assigns at the Will of the Lord of the said Manor according to the Custom thereof at and under the Rents Duties and Services therefor as aforesaid to become due and of Right accustomed (Savine the Right of every Person) And he gave to the Lord of the said Manor for a Rent for his entry into the said premises as appears in the Margin hereof and he was accordingly admitted Tenant thereunto But his Heir was resold.
