

A General Court Baron of Maurice Johnson  
Esquire Lord of the said Manor held in and for the same on Wednesday the twenty second  
day of May in the thirteenth year of the reign of our Sovereign Queen Victoria and  
in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty by and before John  
Carter Gentleman Deputy Steward of John Richard Carter Gentleman Chief Steward  
of the Courts of the said Manor

Amongst other things it is thus enrolled

At this Court was certified by the said Deputy Steward and found and presented by the Homage to be enroled an absolute surrender made and duly passed out of Court from Joseph Rose Thomas Rose and John Rose and which said surrender is contained and enrolled in the words following (that is to say) "The Manor of Spalding with its Members in the County of Lincoln. Be it remembred that on the twenty second day of May in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty Joseph Rose formerly of Spalding in the County of Lincoln but now of the City of Peterborough Shoemaker Thomas Rose of Spalding aforesaid Butcher and John Rose of Spalding aforesaid Railway Clerk customary tenants of the said Manor came before John Wether Deputy Steward of John Richard Carter Esquire Chief Steward of the Courts of the said Manor and in consideration of the sum of One hundred and five pounds in hand cash and truly paid or otherwise satisfied by William Rose of Spalding aforesaid Grocer (the receipt and payment whereof is hereby acknowledged) did out of Court surrender by the rod into the hands of the Lord of the said Manor by the hands and acceptance of his said Deputy Steward by the rod according to the custom of the said Manor All their three fourth parts or shares and all other their share estate and interest of and in All that messuage or tenement with the shop and the yard and garden thereunto adjoining and belonging situate and being in Spalding aforesaid near to the Colvin or Albert Bridge bounded by the messuage and estate of William White (formerly Rose) Holycross and Chastains executors of Joseph Rose on the south; by the Turnpike Road leading from Spalding to Helbeach on the west; by the messuage and estate of the said William White on the north and by the Estate of Sophilus Russell Buckworth aforesaid on the east with the rights numbers and appurtenances to the same premises belonging or in anywise appertaining thereto which said Buckworth or Cosyfield (now the said Joseph Rose Thomas Rose and John Rose have been this day admitted under the Will of their Grandfather Joseph Rose formerly of Spalding aforesaid Blacksmith and on the death of their father and mother William and Eleanor Rose the tenants for life of the said Cosyfield premises And the reversion and reversionary remainder and remainders rents issues and profits thereof And all the estate right title interest use trust benefit property claim and demand whatsoever of them the said Joseph Rose Thomas Rose and John Rose in to or out of the same premises and every part thereof To the use and behoof of the said William Rose who has been this day admitted to the remaining one fourth part his heirs and assigns for ever according to the custom of the said Manor - Joseph Rose Thomas Rose John Rose Taken and accepted the day and year first above written by me J. Wether Deputy Steward for this sum £105 - Joseph Rose Thomas Rose John Rose - witness J. Wether". By virtue of which said Surrender so made and duly passed to the use of the said William Rose as aforesaid he the said William Rose humbly prayed the favor of the Lord of this Manor that he might be admitted tenant of and to the said premises comprised in the said surrender with the appurtenances To whom the Lord of the said Manor by his said Deputy Steward did grant and deliver seigm thereof by the rod **TO HOLD** the said premises with the appurtenances unto him the said William Rose his heirs and assigns of the Lord of the said Manor at the Will of the Lord according to the custom of the said Manor at and under the rents dues and services therefore as anciently to become due and of right accustomed (saving the right of every person) And he paid to the Lord of the said Manor the Fine for his entry into the said premises as appears in the margin hereof and he was accordingly admitted tenant though but his Deed was resisted
